Andrew Hudson was hot.

"The crux of the whole issue is that the point of talk radio is to throw everything up in the air and see what sticks to the wall." Hudson said. "At the same time, a tragic murder has occurred where the murder victim's character is completely assassinated, and she can't defend herself. Is that appropriate?"

Says Boyles: "Andrew's job is to come to work and make a mountain out of a molehill. (Nonetheless) I plan on walking in and shaking his hand and try and figure out where the train went off the tracks."
